



Southcentral

Anchorage Park Foundation: \$385,000 for its Community Challenge Grant Program. The program helps individuals and organizations take on small projects to improve local parks and trails. Labor, donated materials and services and cash are matched on a 1-to-1.

Rural Alaska Community Action Program: \$250,000 to repair 124 existing supportive housing units, to ensure they remain viable. RurAL CAP works to address community development, housing and childcare. They operate sixteen housing facilities in Anchorage.

Thread: \$100,000 to renovate and refurbish new office space. Thread works to increase the availability, affordability and quality of early childcare and education across Alaska.

Girdwood Inc.: \$350,000 to support a new expanded childcare center for Little Bears Playhouse, Girdwood's only licensed facility.

Valley Residential Services: \$150,000 to go towards the construction of a new low-income accessible housing development. Valley Residential Services manages 30 housing properties consisting of 198 residential units serving the special needs of 250 residents in Palmer, Wasilla, and Houston.

Love Inc of the Kenai Peninsula: \$200,000 to assist the Nikiski Shelter of Hope with a sprinkler system and new electrical and fire alarm systems.

City of Soldotna: \$450,000 to construct a field house to host sporting events and indoor recreation for youth and community members. The building will feature sports courts, turf fields and an elevated walking and jogging track. It will fill a community need for safe and accessible recreation.

Kenai Peninsula Housing Initiatives: \$120,000 to support a six-unit housing development serving independent seniors ages 55 and older. Kenai Peninsula Housing Initiatives provides affordable housing to low-income, disabled and special needs residents of the Kenai.

Interior

Interior Alaska Center for Non-Violent Living: \$76,600 to repair electrical wiring and replace security cameras. Interior Alaska Center for Non-Violent Living is located in Fairbanks and supports 42 villages in the Interior Region with services related to domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking.

North Star Council on Aging: \$250,000 for final renovations and upgrades to the Fairbanks Senior Center. North Star Council on Aging provides nutrition, transportation, homemaker and respite services, recreation, social and human services.

Galena Village (Louden Tribe): \$130,000 for swimming pool and activity center upgrades. The renovation will update the aging facility. Since 2001, the Galena swimming pool has been a vital community resource where kids and adults learn a vital skill and enjoy year-round water recreation.

Southeast

Residential Youth Care Inc.: \$600,000 to support the construction of a Ketchikan youth center called SeaLevel. The new center will house meeting rooms, study spaces, studios for art and music, a retail café and a common lounge. The center will act as a community hub with accessible services and support for youth.

Raven Radio: \$400,000 to replace aging transmitters, antennas and tower equipment across southeast Alaska. The upgrades will increase service reliability, improve power consumption and add remote technology monitoring.

Statewide

Alaska Library Network: \$249,000 to digitize primary sources on Alaska and Arctic history from across the United States, allowing libraries, museums, universities, researchers, and individuals access Alaska's rich history at a global scale. The ALN works on behalf of all Alaska libraries.

Koahnic Broadcast Corporation: \$100,000 for digital upgrades and studio improvements to enhance multimedia and broadcast offerings. Koahnic operates KNBA-FM 90.3 and produces Indigenous-focused nationwide programming that creates economic value, revitalizes language, preserves tradition, and celebrates Native culture.

Recover Alaska: \$750,000 over three years, renewing support for this statewide collaboration. The funds will support efforts to change public attitudes about drinking, help Alaskans get treatment and advocate for laws supporting healthier communities.

The Foraker Group: \$3,000,000 over five years of to support the organization's work as a resource for nonprofits across Alaska, which includes free and affordable services, responding to emergent needs, and additional technical assistance requests.
